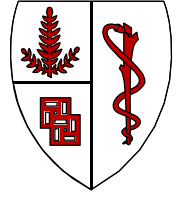


Postdoctoral Fellowship in Clinical Child Psychology

Child and Adolescent Psychiatry and Child Development
Stanford University School of Medicine



The fellowship offered in the Outpatient Clinics within the Division of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry at Stanford provides the opportunity for advanced clinical training in the area of child and adolescent psychology. During the year long fellowship, fellows conduct diagnostic evaluations, on-going treatment, and psychological testing. Treatment includes individual, family and group therapy. A variety of treatment modalities are utilized including cognitive behavioral therapy, behavior modification, pivotal response training, family-based therapy, and psychodynamic psychotherapy.

Rotations

The fellowship is made up of three rotations. Each fellow spends 50% of his/her time in either Anxiety Disorders Clinic or Depression Clinic, 25% in Eating Disorders Clinic and 25% in Autism and Developmental Disabilities Clinic.

Clinic Descriptions

Anxiety Disorders Clinic conducts evaluations and treatment of children and adolescents who have symptoms such as excessive worries and fears. Common diagnoses for this clinic include Panic Disorder, Agoraphobia, Social and specific Phobias, Obsessive Compulsive Disorder, Posttraumatic Stress Disorder, and Separation Anxiety.

Depression Clinic conducts evaluations and treatment of children and adolescents who have symptoms such as depressed mood, increased or decreased energy, hopelessness, and suicidality. Common diagnoses for this clinic include Major Depression and Dysthymia.

Eating Disorders Clinic conducts evaluations and treatment of children and adolescents who have difficulties with eating and feeding. Common diagnoses for this clinic include Anorexia Nervosa (AN), Bulimia Nervosa (BN), and Eating Disorder NOS. Children with other eating/feeding related problems are also treated. Treatments consist of family-based psychotherapy, CBT, and IPT.

Autism and Developmental Disabilities Clinic conducts primarily ongoing treatment of children and adolescents who have developmental delays, and learning and social difficulties. Common diagnoses for this clinic include Autism, Aspergers Disorder, and Pervasive Developmental Disorder, Not Otherwise Specified. (Neuropsychological testing is not conducted in this clinic.)

Clinical Training

Fellows spend 20 hours per week in direct patient care. They conduct one to two new patient evaluations each week and carry ongoing individual psychotherapy and/or family

therapy cases. Fellows also participate in at least one group (Autism, ADHD, Anxiety, or Depression) throughout the year. Psychological testing cases (approximately one per month) are also conducted throughout the year.

Didactic Training

Fellows attend two didactic training seminars that meet on a weekly basis throughout the year. One hour focuses on diagnosis and treatment of specific disorders treated in each of the specialty clinics. The other hour focuses on ethics in preparation for licensure. Child Psychiatry Grand Rounds take place once a month.

Supervision

Fellows receive a minimum of four hours of supervision each week. Two hours of individual supervision a week is provided by the staff in the assigned clinics. The remaining two hours are group supervision.

Applications

Start date is September 1, 2009. All applicants must: 1) have attended APA-accredited graduate programs in clinical or counseling psychology; 2) have completed APA-accredited internship; 3) have completed all requirements for their Ph.D. *prior* to beginning their appointment. Appointments are for one year.

Application deadline is January 7, 2009.
